

Thank you for your request for white flags from Nebraska811! We strongly encourage white lining whenever possible.

White Lining is the practice of outlining and labeling the proposed excavation areas using white paint or flags prior to arrival of the locator(s).

#### **How to White Line:**

- Outline area or proposed path of excavation or,
- Place a single flag in the center of the proposed excavation site and clearly indicate the radius that needs to be located.




## **Benefits of White Lining:**

- Premarking allows the excavators to accurately communicate to facility owners/operators
  or their locator where excavation is to occur which saves the locators time and helps to
  avoid confusion and project delays.
- Excavation crews can identify the work area at the site.
- Excavation damages may be reduced or prevented due to more accurate utility markings.


# **Excavator Responsibilities - Know The Basics:**

- Call before you dig at least 2 but not more than 10 business days.
- Check for accuracy of the information on your ticket including the map.
- Be sure all utilities on the ticket have responded by the start time.
- Hand or soft dig within the tolerance zone





- Marks 12 18" long,1" wide, 4 50' apart
- Outline or dot the extent of excavation
- Identify corners with solid angles
- Identify excavator name

- Marks 12 18" long,
   1" wide, 4 50' apart
- Outline or dot the extent of excavation
- Identify corners with solid angles
